**Questioning the Author** Dont accept everything you read at face value Ask yourself What is the authors purpose What evidence do they provide Are there any biases present This 2 helps you critically evaluate the information presented

**Identifying the Argument** What is the central claim or argument the author is making What supporting evidence is used Is the evidence compelling and relevant Understanding the argument structure strengthens your ability to evaluate its validity

**Synthesizing Information** Connect the ideas presented in the text to your prior knowledge and experiences This helps you build a deeper understanding and form your own informed opinions

**Critical Thinking Analyzing and Evaluating Information** Critical thinking is more than just thinking its evaluative thinking It involves

**Identifying Assumptions** Recognize underlying beliefs or presuppositions that influence the authors perspective

**Recognizing Biases** Be aware of potential biases whether conscious or unconscious that might affect the information presented

**Evaluating Evidence** Assess the quality and relevance of the evidence used to support claims Is the evidence credible Is it sufficient to support the conclusion

**Identifying Logical Fallacies** Learn to recognize common errors in reasoning such as straw man arguments ad hominem attacks and appeals to emotion Many resources including online tutorials and Pearsons own supplementary materials can help you understand these fallacies
